First Quarter Grant Recipients awarded \$1.1 million!

Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council was awarded an additional \$600,000 towards the construction of the Journey Recovery Center. The plan for the Center will combine its residential treatment services in one location. The Center will accommodate 30 male treatment beds, 18 female treatment beds and a new detox center.

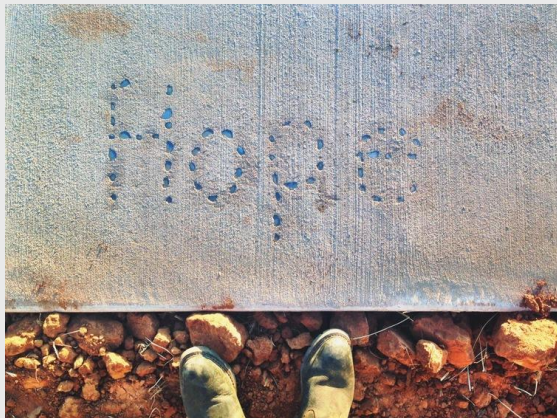
Angelo State University's Laura W. Bush Institute for Women's Health was awarded \$268,686 over two years for the Access to Breast Care for West Texas program. The funds will enable them to continue their mission of assisting women in ten counties with breast cancer screening and treatment programs.

Pregnancy Help Center was awarded \$200,000 to add an STD clinic at their existing facility. The STD clinic will fill a gap in services for the Concho Valley by providing free STD testing, counseling and education.

Sonrisas Trails was awarded \$71,500 toward the construction of a therapeutic ropes course for veterans, children and adults with disabilities. Studies have shown the physical and mental benefits of their equine therapy are the same for a therapeutic ropes course. The ropes course will enhance the therapeutic benefits of their programs.

Second Quarter Grant Recipients

Concho Christmas Celebrations was awarded \$13,121 to install additional poinsettias along the Concho River for the annual light display. The additional poinsettias will complete the poinsettia displays along the banks of the Concho River by the San Angelo Visitor Center. 71,000 people from 248 cities and 30 states toured the display in 2017.

Howard College was awarded \$40,000 over three years for quarterly nonprofit training. The topics will benefit nonprofits by providing valuable training and information pertinent to the nonprofit environment. Howard College offers a wide assortment of associate degrees, training certifications and continuing education classes.

Miles Empowerment Association was awarded \$75,000 for a new community playground. The playground structure will be installed at the City Park in Miles. Miles Empowerment Association's mission is to bring pride to the community of Miles by building a better future for the

children and a brighter place to call home.

Mosaic in San Angelo was awarded \$98,863 for maintenance and equipment for the Redwine Childcare Center. Mosaic in San Angelo provides care for intellectually disabled adults and children. They are unique in offering care at their Redwine Childcare Center which enrolls children with or without disabilities.

San Angelo Area Foundation was awarded \$50,000 to develop a revisioning plan on potential uses for Santa Fe Park. Santa Fe Park located along the North Concho River from Caddo Street to Randolph Street encompasses the Santa Fe Golf Course, Kids Kingdom and open community park areas.

Sterling City First United Methodist Church Pre-School was awarded \$75,000 toward a new playground. The Pre-School began as a Mother's Day Out program offering care one day a week. They have evolved to a recognized 3-Star Program by Texas Rising Star offering care five days a week. They are the only licensed day care facility in Sterling City.

Third Quarter Grant Recipients

Sonora Emergency Relief Fund was awarded \$50,000 to help those affected by the recent flooding. Over 200 homes experienced flooding displacing hundreds of families in the community. Relief efforts are being coordinated through the Sonora Ministerial Alliance and the San Angelo Area Foundation which is accepting donations to provide emergency assistance.

Angelo State University was awarded \$24,985 to purchase treatment tables for the Athletic Department. The Athletic Training Department provides sports medicine treatment for 450 student athletes. Angelo State University averages 25 students in their Athletic Training Department.

Texas Southwest Council of Boy Scouts was awarded \$60,000 to renovate Camp Sol Mayer's First Aid Lodge. The Council serves over 1,000 youth in a 23 ½ county territory covering the Concho Valley. Every year Camp Sol Mayer accommodates over 1,000 campers.

Cook Children's Health Foundation was awarded \$38,753 to purchase medical equipment for the San Angelo Specialty Clinic. The Clinic provides multiple pediatric specialty services to San Angelo including Cardiology, Endocrinology, Hematology/Oncology and Neurology. The San Angelo Clinic served 1,065 patients in 2017.

Menard County Hospital District was awarded \$225,000 for renovations to Menard Manor. Menard Manor is a skilled nursing and rehab center in Menard. The Manor provides services to the elderly, disabled and physical therapy patients as well as independent living accommodations.

Grantee Spotlight

Galilee Community Development Corporation

Our focus is affordable housing. Our programs cover everything from new home construction to minor repairs on homes of the elderly. This year we celebrated the completion of our 50th



affordable home. We partner with the City to build 6 homes in the designated targeted revitalization neighborhoods each year, helping families to establish roots and build community. Galilee CDC also builds homes for low to moderate-income first-time homebuyers.

NoAH Estates consists of 36 low income rental homes which are part of a Low-Income Housing Tax Credit we were awarded in 2012. We opened the homes in 2013 and have been fully occupied since then.

For disabled homeowners, we have a program that allows us to hire contractors to come in and remodel a home to make it more accessible. We work on 5-7 of these projects a year.

Helping Hands is a program for homeowners over 60 that need some repair work done on their homes. This program is primarily funded through the United Way and we have been fortunate to be awarded matching funds to address critical repairs on the homes before our volunteers go out to work on the home. We make repairs to approximately 40 homes a year.

Our newest program is the Jeremiah Plan transitional housing. We are finishing up construction on 3 homes that will house families on the verge of becoming homeless for 12-18 months to give them an opportunity to get back on their feet and move into a stable housing environment. This program provides housing at a reduced rate and we have a financial coach to work with each family to help them meet their housing goals.

We are excited to continue to serve our community in ways that make an impact on their daily lives.

Fourth Quarter Grant Recipients

Grape Creek Independent School District was awarded \$54,060 to purchase a greenhouse, aquaponics and hydroponics system. This unique class offers students at the Middle School the opportunity to learn horticulture hands-on.

Make-A-Wish Foundation was awarded \$25,000 to grant Wishes to San Angelo children. Make-A-Wish has been granting Wishes nationwide since the 1980s to critically ill children. In San Angelo they have granted Wishes to over 70 children.



San Angelo Area Foundation was awarded \$25,000 for the amplification fund for the San Angelo Gives program to be held in May 2019. This is a one day, 24-hour online fundraising effort to benefit local charities, which generated \$1.6 million in donations for 173 participating organizations this year.

Sonora Flood Relief Fund was awarded \$200,000 for long term recovery assistance to help those affected by the recent flooding. 279 homes had flood damage displacing hundreds of families in the community. Recovery efforts are being coordinated by the Sutton County Long Term Recovery Group.

West Texas Counseling and Guidance Center was awarded \$650,000 to expand veterans programs, suicide prevention efforts and mental health services with the renovation of two floors at the Cactus Hotel. West Texas Counseling and Guidance Center has been providing services to the Concho Valley since the 1970s. Over the last 40 years the Center has served more than 70,000 men, women and children by providing mental health services including those with low incomes or without insurance.

West Texas Rehab Center was awarded \$1,000,000 for the construction of a building at their current location to house Hospice of San Angelo which they acquired this year, Hospice Bereavement Services, storage for durable medical equipment and housing for their Student Therapist here for clinical rotations. The expansion allows the Rehab Center to have one campus for all of their rehabilitation and treatment programs.

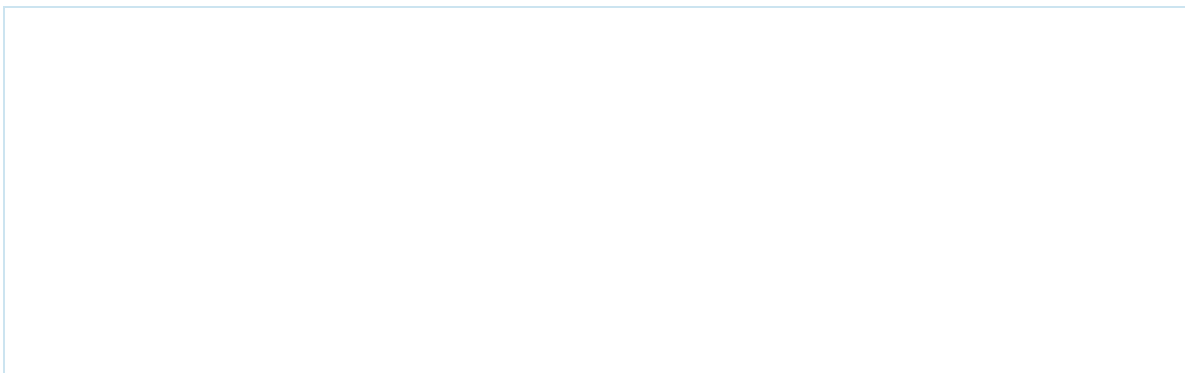
